## **"The Chance of a Lifetime"**

Over half this school year has already come and gone and if you are like me you wonder where all the time has gone. I guess the old saying holds true here, "Time flies when you are having fun." Everyone is aware of the construction that is taking place on our campus. Since the 2008-09 registration packets have been mailed out, and re-enrollment applications have come in at a record pace, everyone is aware that our Board of Directors has decided to take TRA to another level through a change in the dress code to school uniforms. Change appears to be everywhere at TRA, and the excitement on our campus is a good sign that people like what they see. While these changes are necessary to help move TRA forward, they are by no means the answer to all of our needs. Times as they are, more changes are forthcoming.

The construction projects are moving along progressively. We are a little bit behind due to all of the rain; however, the buildings are on schedule to be finished in plenty of time for the 2008-09 school year. Watching the construction has been very exciting. I have had the opportunity to do a walk-through every week, and each time I go through the buildings I get very excited about the possibilities. We hope to set up a time for you to tour the buildings as soon as it dries out. We plan to set the tours around a cookout one Friday night in April and invite you all down to see the progress.

Another area of change that will be instituted in 2008-09 is a standardized dress code. TRA tries to make decisions regarding what is best for our school. We are implementing a standardized dress code to ensure continuity and to allow for variety and individual taste. Our research supported the fact that school uniforms have a positive impact on a school and led us to evaluate this issue for our school. Student individuality is a concern regarding dress. We believe that individuality is more of an internal gift than an external expression. We would never seek to hinder individuality, but would hope to promote it through the student's realization that God has a special plan for each life.

Another area of change that most of you are unaware of is the effort of shifting our focus from teaching to learning. It has been said by some very strong educators that the most important paradigm shift that must occur for a school to evolve into a community of learners is the transition from a focus on teaching to a focus on learning. We are just beginning the process of making that shift. It is our plan to go at this very slowly. However, our teachers have gotten off to a very good start by reading and discussing the book, "Classroom Instruction That Works," by Robert Marzano. This is a book of nine instructional strategies that have been researched and practiced in the classroom and proven to be the most effective teaching and learning strategies available. This course of action has moved us to a functional community of learners in our individual buildings and throughout the entire school.

Next steps are to align our teaching with a solid set of grade and subject level standards that insure the knowledge our students need to know and be able to do in that subject. Our teachers have started procedures to bring into line our curriculum with a researched set of standards that are aligned with the ACT and a national assessment. We will start this in English and Math on the lower school level and by subjects in the middle and upper schools. This will be followed by a review of the standards of the next grade to eliminate gaps and overlaps of what we teach. Next we will follow the same progression in grade groups of the lower, middle, and upper grades and subjects. Finally we will back plan our entire curriculum from 12<sup>th</sup> grade to kindergarten to insure that our children are exposed to and taught the information and knowledge that they need to know and be able to do in order to be successful in college and careers.

As you can see a great deal of work lies ahead of us, but the momentum continues to grow as our staff continues to collaborate and engage in meaningful staff development that builds toward a professional learning community format. The most important thing about all the changes is that your child will be better prepared to meet the challenges of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Therefore it goes without saying that not all change is as visible and as easy to recognize as buildings and new dress requirements. Some change is internal and absolutely essential for the proper development of your son or daughter.

## High School News

Well, it is now the middle of February, 2008, and we are quickly approaching the end of another successful year here at TRA. The building program appears to be on schedule for the 2008-2009 school year. We, here in the high school, are anxiously awaiting the signal to pack up our things and move to the new high school. Our teachers have had a tour of the new high school and I know they are already planning how they will utilize the new facility. We are also excited about the purchase of four acres of land to the north of the new high school which will give us access to the sportsplex and an outlet to Gragg Road. We believe this will accommodate our sports program and also ease our traffic situation during pick-up and drop-off time. While we anticipate next year, we are also involved in and planning many activities for the rest of this school year. Our mock trial students competed on the evenings of February 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>. Our physic class attended a competition at UT Martin on February 18<sup>th</sup>. Many of our sophomores and juniors were involved in the American Math Competition Test held here on February 27<sup>th</sup>. On March 3-7, Mrs. Jacobus will hold a cheerleader clinic and select cheerleaders for the 2008-2009 school year. On March 12, report cards will go home for the third quarter. On March 14<sup>th</sup>, we will host two of our most highly attended events- Grandparents' Day and Make-a-Wish. Students will leave at 11:30 on that day. Winners of the local science fair will compete in the Shelby County Fair on March 18<sup>th</sup>. Our school-wide Easter chapel will be held on March 20<sup>th</sup> and our Spring Break will be from March 21-March 28. When we return from spring break, the Navy Band will perform at our chapel on April 3<sup>rd</sup>. Our physics class will also compete at Christian Brothers University on this date. Achievement tests will be given in grades K-9 on April 7-11. The Dyersburg Math Competition will be held on the campus of Dyersburg State Community College. Students in the high school math classes will be selected for this competition. Progress reports for the fourth quarter will be sent home on April 16<sup>th</sup>. Induction for Beta Club, National Honor Society, and Mu Alpha Theta will be held on April 21<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 p.m. in the middle school gymnasium. We will also award student honors at an Honors Day assembly at this time. The Prom will be held at the Pink Palace on the evening of April 24<sup>th</sup> from 8:00-11:00. The spring drama, Bye, Bye Birdie will be presented April 25-27. May 6<sup>th</sup> will be the last day for seniors, with their exams scheduled for May 7-9. Baccalaureate will be held at the Munford Baptist Church on the evening of May 12<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. Graduation will be held in the Middle School gym at 7:00p.m.on the evening of May 16<sup>th</sup>. High school exams are scheduled for May 19-21. May everyone have a great summer as we anticipate the coming year in our new facilities.

## From the Director of Advancement...

At the beginning of the year, I wrote an article for this Tribune explaining the concept of the new Advancement Office. We are 3 people, Lori Regis – Director of Advancement, Gail Wise – Administrative Advancement Assistant, and Amy Ford – Special Events Coordinator. Our goal is to not only “advance” the school in enrollment and gifted funds, it is also to communicate to our families, new, old and potential, what we are all about. I think it is safe to say that we have had a successful first year as the “Advancement Office”!

School began with 679 students – 166 of them were new. Since then we have had 15 more new students to start and we have mailed out TRA information packets to 223 inquiring families. We are touring these potential families on a regular basis, and in the midst of our messy construction and all of our apologizing for the “vision” they have to possess to even understand what it will be like next year - they get it. More than one family has commented that it just “feels right”. Some leave here hugging every one of us on their way out the door. One new mother actually had us in tears explaining that her mom, who had recently passed away, must have led them straight here. And they are correct, it just feels right. We are blessed and we have always known that, sometimes it’s just easy to forget.

February has been a big month for the Advancement office with 2 testing dates for our potential students and our newly implemented administrative interview nights. We realized that once school starts in the fall, things move so quickly, and while each new family has been properly introduced and informed, they really have not had any personal time with their principal to share needs and expectations. We have created this opportunity for them before their contract is due, and while 20-30 minutes is still not enough time, our new families have appreciated the genuine interest that our principals have taken in their child’s experience. During the 08-09 enrollment process so far, we have tested 96 new students and interviewed 57 new families.

Because we are in the construction process, instead of an on campus Open House, we are hosting 5 satellite “Meet and Greet” functions in our neighboring communities to spread the word about TRA. Please pass along the post cards that were sent home with your child or have your friends check the website for more information. Prizes are involved!

Finally, our Continuing the Tradition Capital Campaign is coming to a close. Obviously, the billing and pledge commitments will continue for three to five years, and it is NEVER too late to give; however, our family solicitation phase is through. Thank you again to those supporter’s who have helped us turn a vision into a reality. I truly think that we left no stone unturned and while perfection is nearly impossible, we definitely went all-out to do it right. To date, the following numbers are correct:
